Reporting Animal Care Concerns: "Whistle-Blower Policy"

Any person who has concerns regarding any aspect of the care and use of animals in research or teaching at The University of Texas at Austin is encouraged to voice that concern. The Attending Veterinarian has the authority and responsibility for ensuring compliance with all animal care and use standards and is an appropriate person to receive initial concerns.

There are a number of options available to communicate concerns about animal care and use at The University of Texas at Austin, or to report instances of suspected non-compliance with laws, rules, regulations, and policies. The names and phone numbers of contact persons, including the Attending Veterinarian, the Director of the Office of Research Support (ORS), and the Compliance HelpLine should be posted in animal facilities.

Attached to this newsletter is a poster that contains this information, and should be posted in animal facilities (including labs).

Welcome Back Everyone

A new academic year is here and there may be new faces in the lab. Be sure to update your protocol(s) personnel listing.

For eProtocols: you must initiate the personnel revision online by creating AND submitting a protocol REVISION.

For Legacy Protocols: Personnel changes for Legacy Protocols (e.g., paper protocols) must use the Protocol Personnel Modification Form (PPMF) to add or remove personnel.

Contacting the IACUC

Always use the general IACUC email address (IACUC@austin.utexas.edu) for all IACUC correspondence. If anything is sent to an individual's email address, response may be delayed if that person is absent.

Ethics of Animal Use

The use of animals in research, teaching, and/or testing is an important ethical and political issue. Using live or dead animals in research, teaching, and/or testing requires that the researcher accept certain responsibilities. Webster's dictionary defines 'ethics' as:

- 1. The principles of honor and morality;
- 2. Accepted rules of conduct;
- 3. The moral principals of an individual.

Animal experimentation continues to be challenged by some individuals on the basis that it is immoral; that humans do not have the right to "exploit" other species, even if the experimentation may benefit humans and animals.

Those who believe that the knowledge gained for the benefit of humans AND animals more than justifies this use also believe that the animals must be used in an ethical manner. This means that there are certain rules of conduct that must be followed to ensure that experiments involving animal use are ethical. A summary of those rules is called **The 3 Rs**.

eProtocol Tip of the Month

Why was my protocol RETURNED? The Vice President for Research established the Office of Research Support (ORS) to serve as an administrative office to support the IACUC. The ORS receives protocols and screens them regarding compliance with administrative requirements, readability, and completeness. Protocols are usually returned because questions have not been answered, additional details are required, etc.

The next IACUC Full Committee Review (FCR) is **October 11, 2010**.

The deadline to submit materials for review is **September 17, 2010**.
